G1. Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Sourcebook

DESCRIPTION: The Department of the Interior has compiled the *Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Sourcebook* to assist states, communities and Tribes in locating potential, existing sources of Federal, State, and philanthropic support for Bicentennial projects. Details on programs and foundations supporting projects in the areas of community and economic development, cultural resource management and historic preservation, education, infrastructure and transportation, museum and library services, natural resource management and conservation, and recreation has been included in the *Sourcebook*. Information in the *Sourcebook* has been divided into four chapters: Federal Assistance, National Foundations, Multi-State Foundations, and State Government Programs and State-Specified Foundations. Within these categories, states, Tribes and communities will not only find support for projects such as trail maintenance and construction, historical and cultural events, classroom materials and others, but also for projects designed to bolster transportation systems, public safety, and related community infrastructure that may be strained by increased tourist activity associated with the Bicentennial.

F1. Challenge Cost Share Program: USDA Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, National Park Service

DESCRIPTION: The Challenge Cost Share (CCS) program provides matching funds to non-federal organizations for projects that provide new or enhanced opportunity for protection, interpretation, or recreation at sites or segments of the Lewis & Clark National Historic Trail. Once a project is approved, a cooperative agreement is prepared between the Agency and the partnership organization. Agency funding is made on a reimbursement basis for actual cost. This program is not an "up front" grant. The agreement requires some level of Agency involvement in the project.
